## **Pigs Talking**

Both Irish and British Houses of Commons have similar political appointments for their 'Speakers'. Principally, the public perceive these appointments as a form of 'authority to silence' members of their houses to maintain order of conduct of business.

In London the representative members are extroverts and project a public act of vivaciousness and honor and clarity sometimes becoming a celebrity.

In Dublin the representative members embolden an insular introvert ritual and project a bland public act of tribal coded secrecy that lacks transparency and connectivity and causes confusion in the house.

The Speakers in each parliament perform indifferently. The word ORDER is the rule dispensed by the Speaker of HMS in the House of Commons and frequently applied during the course of business. It is a word that makes simple sense and understanding. It is delivered normally with a long growl and strong vocal emphasis 'OR-DER'. Simply understood.

In Dublin the Speaker uses a different word CIUNAS to dispense the rule of order in the house. It is a terminology first used since the formation of The State in 1922. It officially means SILENCE. It is pronounced by the Dublin Speaker silently accompanying the louder noise of the stumping mace.

The word Silence alone, without 'authority to silence', as used in Dublin, is not appropriate to be used against any public representative. It demeans both the representative and the voters. This is not democracy. It is perceived as a tribal gang-bang or that the Irish Speaker in the House is simply saying SHUT UP. In ancient Gaelic/Wolof from Africa used by Black Homo -Sapiens, the word CIUNAS means 'to call this person to be weak and unenergetic'. Do the Irish electorate deserve this treatment 'for their voices to be heard?
